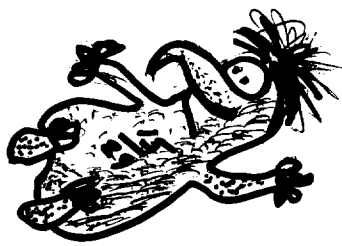

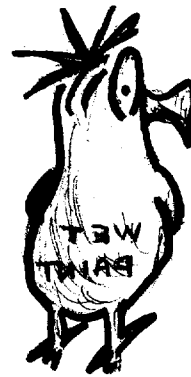

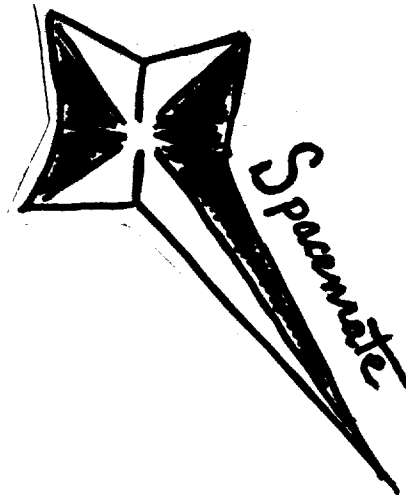

This fall Coach Ben Martin again leads the Falcons into another "man-killer" schedule. Army, Colorado, Washington, and Wyoming present the Falcons with 4 of the Nation's top 20.

Depth seems to be the most serious problem facing the Falcons. To overcome this, many men may go both ways, although the starting platoons are in fine shape. The Falcons actually have 20 returning lettermen and that gives a solid base to expand upon.

The offensive spark should come from the running of Neal Starkey, going offensive for the first time, and Jack Hannig, and the passing of Steve Turner. Turner, in five games at quarterback last season, completed 64 passes for 776 yards and a 54% completion average.

Defensively, the Falcons lack experience on the line, but have 3 fine veteran linebackers in Dave Allen, Bruce Burkey, and Tom Kendal. As backs, Steve Roseman, Tom Zyroll, and Barney Mills present one of the toughest combinations around. The defense would be again bolstered if Starkey fits into Martin's two-way plans.

The toe of Dick Hall may be a deciding factor in many games. Hall scored all of AFA's points in their heartbreaking 10-9 loss to Colorado last year. Dick ranked 7th nationally among placekickers in scoring with 46 points last fall.

There are many things which make up Academy football. The spirit of the Wing is a major one. This is basically a strong team and some support from you will make the difference between a good team and a great team.
